### RESEARCH UPDATE

Reported by Dr. Hirano of Columbia University:

Briefly, we have studied the male FHL1 mutant until ages 20-24 months (mice typically live about 24 months) and we are still analyzing female mutants. We expect to see more dramatic changes in the male mutants because the disease is X-linked. We assessed survival, weight, maximum muscle strength, spontaneous activity, and exercise capacity at age 3-5 months (young mice), one year (adult mice), and older than 1 year-old (old mice).

# RESEARCH UPDATE ( Cont'd)

We observed that affected females and males have normal life spans.

At about age 7-10 months, the mutant males weigh less than normal. We have not observed any differences in female mutants compared to normal females. In addition, 7-10 month old males showed decreased forelimb ("arm") strength and reduced exercise capacity.

Plasma creatine kinase was normal in all mice. In male mice over age 1, muscle shows mild signs of degeneration by microscopic analyses.

We studied cardiac function in the mice at different ages, but we did not observe significant differences between affected and unaffected animals.

We assessed the FHL1 protein, and the morphology of several muscles involved and not involved in the disease, in affected males. Interestingly, FHL1 levels are comparable in affected and unaffected animals in 3-5 months, partially reduced in some muscles of 10 months old affected animals and completely absent in all the muscles of the 2 years old animals.

In summary, as expected, affected male mice have earlier onset and more severe manifestations of the disease, compared with females. Clinically, male mutant animals show an adult onset mild myopathy while female mutants may have late-onset disease.

Our foundation is encouraged by these findings and are currently in the process of issuing another grant to fund continued research. We will keep you updated as findings become available. Look for details in our next newsletter.
